

The thirst for knowledge is one of those things that is so distinctly human it helps define us as a species. For sure, cats and certain other animals may be known for their curiosity, but when it comes to seeking, acquiring, and using information, data, and input – by the truckload – no other creature comes close to us humans. When was the last time you just stopped and watched a child, even an infant, at play? If you have done so recently, then you probably noticed that, amidst the banging of toys on the floor and chewing on anything that fits in their mouths, lies a constant experimentation and desire to figure out how things work. How does the little cup fit into the bigger cup? What happens when I push that button?

And this quest for information only becomes greater and more intense over time. Go into any average home and you will most likely find at least one bookcase filled with books that have been read by their owners and some kind of computing or mobile device that is used regularly to access data for the benefit of their owners. Clearly, with every day that passes, we move more deeply into an age in which there is more information available than we can ever possibly digest, making it more important than ever to make the right choices about the data we consume.

But how can we know if we are focusing on the right input? Well, in the world of computers and computing, there has long been an adage that states, “garbage in – garbage out,” meaning that if the programming or data that is put into a computer is garbage – worthless, tainted, erroneous – then the user should expect the computer’s output to likewise be garbage. I believe this adage has applications for our lives today as Christians. In John 13:35, Jesus said:

“By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.”

Is the output of our lives demonstrating, to those who might observe us, the right kind of input in our lives - input that is conducive to a quest to be better disciples of Jesus as seen in the love we have for one another. Or are our favorite nightly news shows, depicting violence and division on almost every channel, filling us with anger, hatred, and judgmentalism that dominates our thinking, our conversation, and our social media posts? Has our sensitivity and aversion to promiscuity, crude humor, and general immorality been eroded by our choices of television shows, movies, and other forms of entertainment?

If so, perhaps it’s time to start unplugging from much of this “garbage” input and replacing it with that “right” input that will produce the preferred output – you know, love, compassion, faith, humility, grace. Fortunately, the right input sources are readily available to us right now. Bible study, prayer, and staying connected with the body of Christ through the activities of your church can restore the balance that is needed in life to make sure our output reflects our attention to the right input. Becoming involved in missional activities that actually make the world around us a better place, rather than just complaining about all that is wrong, provides tangible opportunities to actually do the work of building God’s kingdom.

Now, it may not be possible, or even advisable, to completely ignore what’s going on around us in this world. But if we just make the conscious decision to begin paying a little more attention to the good news of Christ, and a little less to what the world tells us is important, we might be surprised at how our whole focus and outlook on life becomes healthier and our output less filled with garbage. Now who wouldn’t want to give that a try?

"I encourage you, as church musicians, to be the hands and feet of Jesus in your community and spheres of influence, and to shine the light of Christ's peace, love, and hope.

We all feel the difficulties and pain of the pandemic, sickness and death, social distancing, and, in particular for us, a lack of choral music making right now. The very thing that most encourages and comforts us through unrest of all sorts is silent right now. But take heart, and know that choirs will sing again. Choral singing has endured for thousands of years, and is too valuable to let slip away. This is a *fermata* - a pause- but not a final barline on choral music making. When choirs start singing again, it will be from a deeper place, musically, personally, emotionally and spiritually."
